From the Senior Pastor

Friends,

What a way to start the new year—with heaps of snow and record-setting negative temperatures, all brought to us by a distortion in the polar vortex.

Polar vortex, you ask? So did I. The polar vortex, I've learned, is the definitive term for upper-level winds, working counter clockwise in a low-pressure weather system, that normally keeps frigid arctic air confined far to our north. On occasion, though, the winds change. The normal patterns break. And when they do, the frigid air slips south, giving us a taste of arctic cold.

This first storm of 2014 has been reported as the coldest, most dangerous blast of polar air to hit the Midwest in decades. The burning chill of the wind brought about a state of emergency in our city and county. Schools were closed, and a slew of activities, among them church services and meetings, were cancelled.

The arctic air, along with its hazards, has now largely receded to a more normal range. The cold remains, but without the heightened degree of danger. I would caution, though, that we not presume too much of normal in our lives. Great storms prompt consideration of new normals.

We are no strangers to storms and states of emergency. I look upon them as strange expressions of grace, inviting us to pause and wonder. What more is in store for us? What else will alter our normal patterns of life? In such pause, relief and regret can often be found. Always, there is opportunity to freshly assess how God is informing our lives.

Howard Thurman once spoke of “**pause**” as a “**very great and intimate privilege.**” In our pauses, we see more clearly perhaps; we listen more intently and pray more earnestly. In one such pause, Thurman prayed: “**We anticipate tomorrow, not because it is our promise and our due but because there is within us a deep yearning for the fulfillment of that which we have not known before, for the opportunity to be what, if we have another chance, we think we may become.**”

As a congregation, we are on the threshold of a new year. It is a brief but ever-so-significant pause in which we are wise to reassess our lives in the flow of the time we are apportioned. It offers us another chance to grow; to seek the better that lies beyond our good; to minister so as to bless rather than curse, to heal rather than harm; to be alert to shifts in weather, and to huddle for mutual care and support; to proclaim gospel, showing love and doing mercy like that of God.

I wish us many such pauses in the new year. I pray they come, not for the purposes of rest, but with the intent that we move on bravely, our hopes unfolding in a journey of integrity that ends in the adoration of the One who is our beginning. So may we all attain peace in the praise and glory of God.

Dr. Noor Borbieva, Cultural Anthropologist at IPFW, will speak about, "The State of Russia - US Relations: Challenges Ahead."

Dr. Borbieva holds degrees from Princeton and Harvard, and was a Peace Corps volunteer in the Kyrgyz Republic. She comes to IPFW from the Kellogg Institute at Notre Dame, as a Visiting Fellow. She is an affiliated faculty member of the IPFW Women's Studies Program and the Indiana University (Bloomington) Russian and East European Institute. Dr. Borbieva has published work on religious change and development in the former Soviet Union in *Anthropological Quarterly*, among others, and currently conducts ethnographic research among faith communities in Fort Wayne.

Traveling to Israel and Palestine in 2006, he was transformed by witnessing the occupation of Palestine and by encounters with peace activists and civil society leaders from the Muslim, Christian and Jewish communities. He now devotes himself full time to writing, speaking and action related to a just peace in Israel and Palestine.

Who knows, we may even modify our individual concepts.

Last Call for Scholarship Applications with February 15 Deadlines

Please Note: With **February 15** falling on a Saturday this year, completed applications, along with all supporting materials for scholarships administered by the Grants and Scholarships Committee, that are **postmarked no later than February 15**, or are brought to the church office on **Sunday, February 16**, ***WILL BE*** considered "***received on time.***" As always, incomplete applications are ineligible for consideration.

The Grants and Scholarships Committee has the pleasant responsibility of awarding scholarship grants for **tuition and fees** from the earnings generated by several endowed funds. Completed applications are due in the church office as noted below.

February 15 Deadline

The **Richard Nelson Kent Memorial Fund** provides educational grants for tuition and fees for members of the United Church of Christ in the Northeast [Indiana] Association and other qualified applicants who are at least 16 years of age and entering into or continuing ecological studies, conservation biology, or other environmentally related studies.

The **R. Donald and Genevieve M. Sinish Fund** provides awards for tuition and fees for 16-to-24-year-old members of Plymouth Church.

The **Van Gorder Scholarship** is awarded annually for tuition and fees for post-secondary education leading to a degree, certificate, or license for a graduating senior who is a member of Plymouth Church.

April 15 Deadline

The **Richard C. Hess Peace Studies Scholarship** will award a \$1,000 tuition and fees scholarship for a college student majoring in peace studies or a related program.

Completed applications with all supporting materials must be received in the church office by the stated deadline. As always, incomplete applications are ineligible for consideration.

To request application packets or to receive additional information, call the church office (423-9424) and leave your name, phone number, and e-mail address, so one of the members of the Grants and Scholarships Committee may respond to your request.

One of the newest things at IHN is their name. It is now referred to as, “Just Friends – Interfaith Homeless Network.” The Board at IHN felt that these words more accurately reflect what IHN is: friends helping friends in the face of homelessness. So you will hear it referred to as “IHN” or “Just Friends” either way it remains the only shelter in Fort Wayne that provides emergency housing to families in need of shelter.

Another new thing at IHN, or Just Friends, is Room #5. Through the generosity of the Emma Feigley Fund, Standish and Knit & Kibitz group, along with volunteers, the room has been transformed into an oasis of cheer and welcome. The drab tan walls of the room have been painted a soothing blue, thanks to painters Jim and Diane Lasley, Anne Hughes, Jan Gibson, and Kathryn Diekhoff. The old stained carpet has been replaced with new carpet, and new beds and mattresses have been purchased and put in place. Window screens have been repaired, along with the replacement of window hardware. New, colorful bedding provided by Betty Barry, Ruth Phillips, Terry Springer, Mary Spath, and the Rudolph Family have added visual and physical warmth. A new dresser donated by Becky Hollingsworth, and a bedside table from Sally Felger, provide storage. David Bayle donated two lamps and a package of bulbs, and Sally Felger added a small floor lamp so there can be light to read by.

The final touch was the frame donated by John Escosa that was placed on the door. It holds a placard that proclaims: “No matter who you are or where you are on life’s journey, you are welcome here.” This room is sponsored by Plymouth Congregational Church of Fort Wayne, United Church of Christ. By sponsoring this room, Plymouth will have the joy of periodically maintaining it and the furnishings within it, while proclaiming a welcome to all who pass through its door.



Our check for \$23,094.37 will be split equally between Uganda Teso and Dominican Republic-Bateyes. This money makes possible the educational, training, and funding programs overseen by FRB and its member organizations, directly impacting nearly 23,000 people in those countries.

In addition, 2013 saw our combined funding grow to over \$223,000, and Plymouth's share in this is nearly \$107,000. This has been accomplished through your generosity and commitment to do what Jesus asked of us ... "to care for the least of these." We thank you for what you have made possible over the past nine years, and we look forward to continuing this mission into its 10th year!
